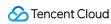

Operation Guide Installing TCCLI

This document describes how to install Tencent Cloud Command Line Interface (TCCLI).

Prerequisites

You have installed the Python environment and pip tool.

Note:

Python 2.7 or later is required. For more information, visit the Python website and pip website.

TCCLI depends on the TencentCloudApi Python SDK. If the version of the SDK is earlier than that of TCCLI, the SDK is automatically upgraded during TCCLI installation. Check the latest TCCLI version at GitHub.

Directions

You can install TCCLI in the following ways:

Using pip (recommended)

Using source code

- 1. The installation command is the same on Windows, macOS, and Linux. Open the command line window on your operating system.
- 2. Run the following command to install TCCLI:





sudo pip install tccli-intl-en

Note:

If you upgrade TCCLI from a version earlier than 3.0.252.3, run the following commands:



3. After the installation is completed, run the following command to check whether the installation is successful:





tccli --version

Run the following commands in sequence to download the TCCLI project from tencentcloud-cli and to install TCCLI by using the setup.py script.



git clone https://github.com/TencentCloud/tencentcloud-cli-intl-en.git





cd tencentcloud-cli-intl-en



python setup.py install



Configuring TCCLI TCCLI Configuration Method

This document describes how to initialize the configuration of Tencent Cloud Command Line Interface (TCCLI) in interactive and command line modes, and how to switch between accounts.

Prerequisites

You have installed TCCLI. For more information, see Installing TCCLI.

Directions

Before using TCCLI, you must initialize its configuration to ensure that the prerequisites for using TencentCloud API are met.


Note:

The secretId, secretKey, and region used in this document are only examples. Replace them with actual information.

Interactive mode

You can enter the interactive mode for quick configuration by running the tccli configure command.





```
$ tccli configure
TencentCloud API secretId [*afcQ]:AKIDz8krbsJ5yKBZQpn74WFkmLPx3******
TencentCloud API secretKey [*ArFd]:Gu5t9xGARNpq86cd98joQYCN3******
region: ap-guangzhou
output[json]:
```

secretId: the SecretId of your TencentCloud API key, which can be obtained at Manage API Key.
secretKey: the SecretKey of your TencentCloud API key, which can be obtained at Manage API Key.
region: the region where your Tencent Cloud product resides. Go to APIs and obtain available regions from the page of your Tencent Cloud product. For example, you can obtain Region List from the page of Cloud Virtual Machine



(CVM).

output: the output format of the request return packet, which is optional. Valid values: json, table, text. Default value: json.

For more information, run the tccli configure help command.

Command line mode

In command line mode, you can configure the information in an automated script.



- # The `set` subcommand is used to configure one or more items.
- \$ tccli configure set secretId AKIDz8krbsJ5yKBZQpn74WFkmLPx3******

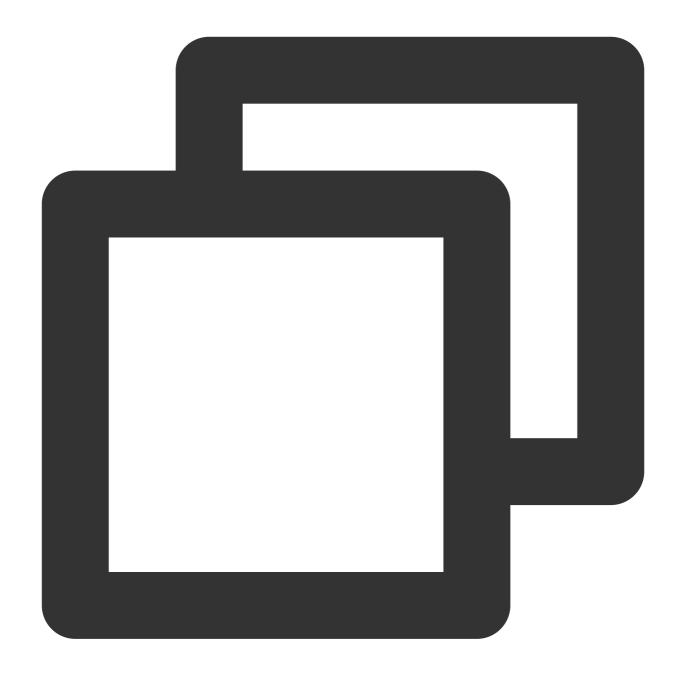

Supporting multiple accounts

TCCLI supports multiple accounts, making it easier for you to use multiple configurations at the same time.





```
# Specify the account name `test` in interactive mode.
$ tccli configure --profile test

$ tccli configure get secretKey --profile test

- \$ tccli configure remove -profile test
- # Specify an account when calling an API such as the DescribeZones API of CVM.
- \$ tccli cvm DescribeZones --profile test

TCCLI configuration file

After you run the tccli configure command, the default.configure and default.credential files for TCCLI are generated under the ~/.tccli directory. Content in the two files is in JSON format.

The default.configure file records the version (the latest version by default) of the API to call, the endpoint (the nearest endpoint by default), the default output format, and the specified region. The default.credential file records your key pairs. Example:

If you specified an account name in the configuration command, the configuration files corresponding to the account name are generated. For example, after you run the test configure --profile test command, the test configure and test credential files are generated.

To modify content in the configuration files, you can directly edit the files or use the set subcommand. For example, you can run the tccli configure set cvm.version 2017-03-12 command to set the version of CVM APIs to call to the default version 2017-03-12.

Configuring environment variables

TCCLI supports configuring TencentCloud API key pairs in environment variables to ensure the security of your information. For example, in Linux, you can configure a key pair in the following ways:

Use 'export' command (temporary)

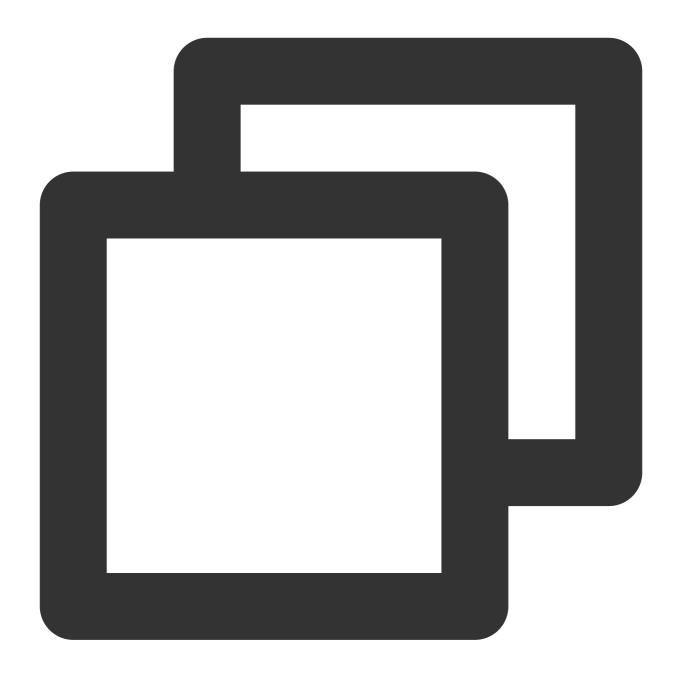
Write into profile file (permanent)


Note:

If you specify the same information in the command, configuration file, and environment variables, the priority order in TCCLI is command > configuration file > environment variables.



Other configurations

TCCLI supports authentication through Cloud Access Management (CAM) roles. For more information, see Role Overview.



The role-arn and role-session-name fields support the get and list subcommands of configure . You can write values into the configuration file, or specify values in the command line, in the same



way that you configure secretId and secretKey, as shown below:



If your instance is bound to a role, you can use the role for authentication, without providing secretId and secretKey. You can use --use-cvm-role to call APIs through the role.

Using an HTTPS Proxy

Run the following command based on the operating system that you use to configure an HTTPS proxy in an environment variable:

export https_proxy=https://myproxy.com:1111



You can also add the command to the environment variable <code>/etc/profile</code> to keep the autocomplete feature active.

Overview

This document describes how to use the basic features of TCCLI.

TCCLI integrates all Tencent Cloud products that support TencentCloud API, and allows you to configure and manage the products. For example, you can use TCCLI to create and operate a Cloud Virtual Machine (CVM) instance, create a Cloud Block Storage (CBS) disk and view its usage, and create a Virtual Private Cloud (VPC) and add resources to it. All operations that can be performed on console pages can be performed by running commands in TCCLI. Examples:

Run the tccli cvm DescribeInstances command to view CVM instances under the current account.

Run the tccli cbs DescribeDisks command to view the list of CBS disks.

Basic Feature Usage


Note:

The following examples are based on Linux. Structures in the examples must be in standard JSON format.

Using TCCLI to create a CVM instance

Run the following command to create a CVM instance:







Using standard input to transfer binary files

TCCLI allows you to call APIs with the content type octet-stream. When calling such APIs, you can use standard input
/path/to/file
to transfer binary files. Example:




Taking the CLS UploadLog API as an example, you can use the following command to tccli cls UploadLog --TopicId xxx < /path/to/file



--cli-unfold-argument

If the API to call uses any structures, you can add _-cli-unfold-argument in the command to use a dot (.) as the concatenation operator for structure input. In this case, you can use the autocomplete feature of TCCLI to make the input process easier. Example:



```
tccli cvm RunInstances --cli-unfold-argument \\
--Placement.Zone ap-guangzhou-3 \\
--ImageId img-8toqc6s3 \\
--DryRun True
```




Note:

You can press the Tab key to complete --cli-unfold-argument . For details, see Using the Autocomplete Feature.

You can specify --cli-unfold-argument in the command only when using TCCLI 3.0.273.1 or later.

--generate-cli-skeleton

You can use --generate-cli-skeleton to generate a parameter skeleton in JSON format. Example:




- # You can also input the generated JSON skeleton into a JSON file.
- # \$ tccli cvm DescribeInstances --generate-cli-skeleton > /home/test.json

You can press the Tab key to complete --generate-cli-skeleton . For more information, see Using the Autocomplete Feature.

You can specify --generate-cli-skeleton in the command only when using TCCLI 3.0.273.1 or later.

--cli-input-json

If there are too many input parameters, you can add --cli-input-json in the command to support input through a JSON file. (Add file://file directory after --cli-input-json .) You can use --generate-cli-skeleton to generate the corresponding JSON file. After specifying parameters in the JSON file, you can use the file to call an API. Example:





tccli cvm DescribeInstances --cli-input-json file:///home/test.json

Note:

You can press the Tab key to complete --cli-input-json . For more information, see Using the Autocomplete Feature.

You can specify --cli-input-json in the command only when using TCCLI 3.0.250.2 or later.



Obtaining Help Information

Directions

Viewing brief help information

Run the following command to view supported Tencent Cloud products. You can also view the products at APIs.





tccli help

Taking Cloud Virtual Machine (CVM) as an example, run the following command to view the CVM APIs that support TCCLI:

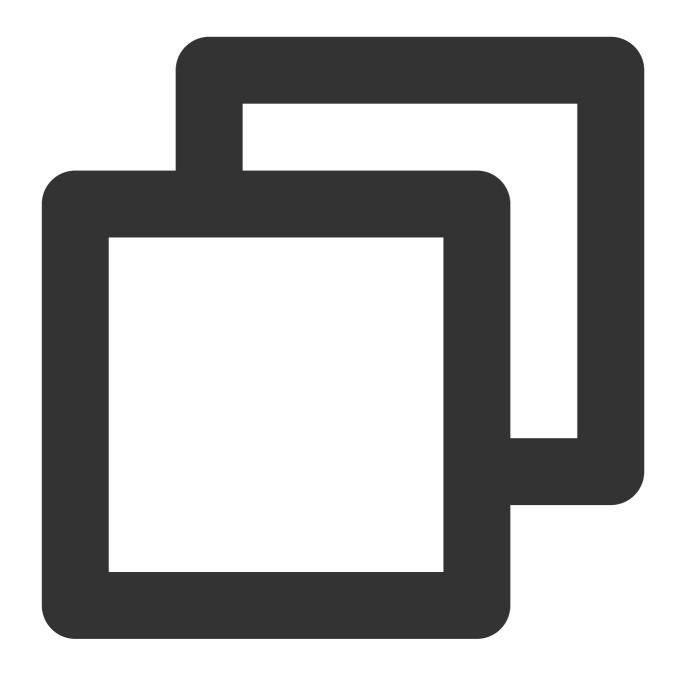




tccli cvm help

Taking the DescribeDisks API of Cloud Block Storage (CBS) as an example, run the following command to view the parameters of the API. For parameter descriptions and API information, see the corresponding API documentation at the Tencent Cloud website.





tccli cbs DescribeDisks help

Viewing detailed help information

TCCLI displays brief help information by default. To view detailed information, use the --detail option.

Run the following command to view the detailed information about supported Tencent Cloud products:





tccli help --detail

Taking CVM as an example, run the following command to view the detailed information about the CVM APIs that support TCCLI:





tccli cvm help --detail

Taking the CBS DescribeDisks API as an example, run the following command to view the detailed information and use cases of the input and output parameters of the API:





tccli cbs DescribeDisks help --detail



Multi-version API Access



By default, TCCLI accesses the latest version of APIs. However, some products have multiple versions of APIs. To access an API of a specific earlier version, refer to this document.

Directions

Taking Cloud Virtual Machine (CVM) as an example, run the following command to set the default API version to 2017-03-12:





tccli configure set cvm.version 2017-03-12

Run the following commands to specify the API version in real time:





```
tccli cvm help --version 2017-03-12
tccli cvm DescribeZones help --version 2017-03-12
tccli cvm DescribeZones --version 2017-03-12
```



Specifying the Nearest Endpoint

Last updated: 2023-02-21 10:41:36

By default, Tencent Cloud Command Line Interface (TCCLI) sends a request to the nearest endpoint to access a service. You can also specify an endpoint for a product.

Directions

Taking Cloud Virtual Machine (CVM) as an example, run the following command to set ap-guangzhou as the default endpoint:





tccli configure set cvm.endpoint cvm.ap-guangzhou.tencentcloudapi.com

Run the following command to set ap-guangzhou as the endpoint in real time when calling the API:





tccli cvm DescribeZones --endpoint cvm.ap-guangzhou.tencentcloudapi.com



Filtering Return Results

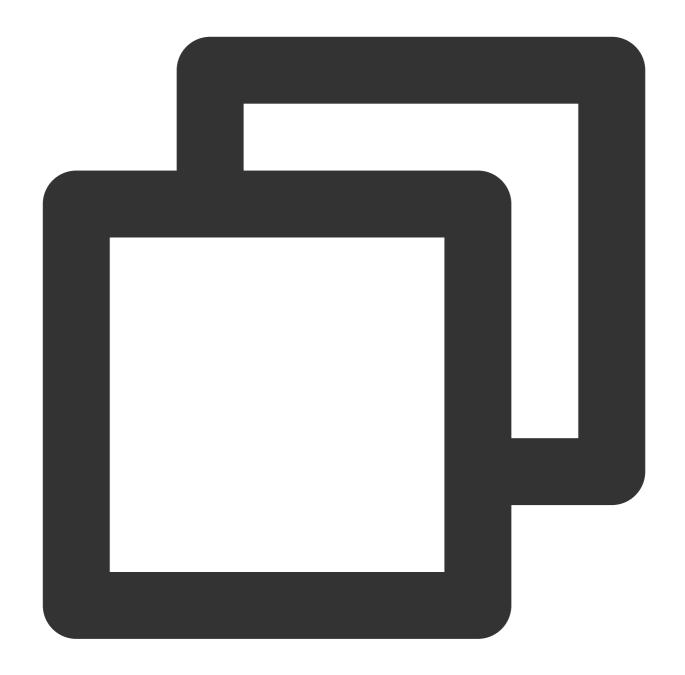

Some commands return much information in the output. You can filter the information as required.

Directions

This document describes how different filtering methods are used and their corresponding outcomes. The DescribeZones API of Cloud Virtual Machine (CVM) is used as an example in this document. View the unfiltered output.







Result Polling

During product use, some operations may not be instantly completed. The result polling feature allows you to periodically check if an operation is completed. For example, after an instance is activated, it may not immediately enter the RUNNING state. In this case, you can use polling to check its status until it enters the RUNNING state.

Directions

Run the following command to initiate a polling program that checks the instance status at a specific interval. The program runs until the instance enters the RUNNING state or until the polling times out.






tccli cvm DescribeInstancesStatus --region ap-hongkong --waiter "{'expr':'InstanceS

You can specify a timeout period and an interval for polling. Run the following command to set the timeout period to 180s and the interval to 5s.

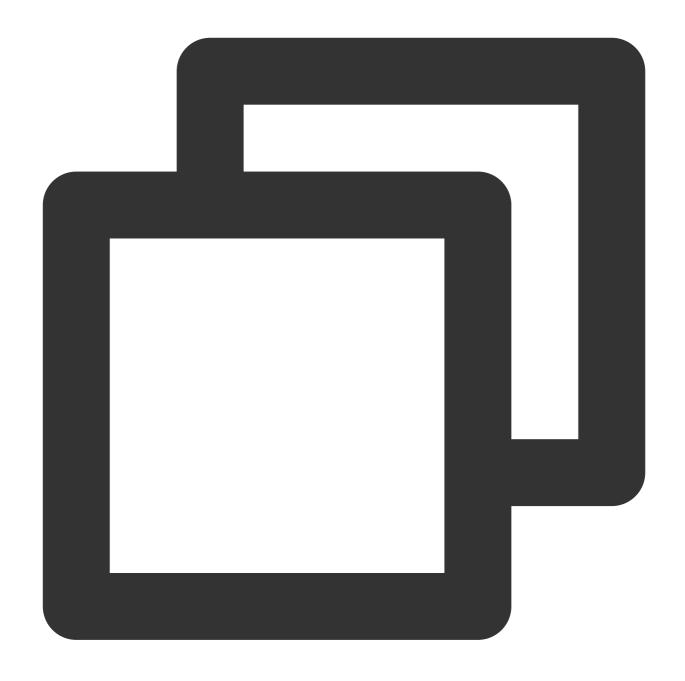




tccli cvm DescribeInstancesStatus --region ap-hongkong --waiter "{'expr':'InstanceS

You can set the values of optional subparameters in the configuration file. Add the following configuration to the default.configure file to specify a timeout period of 180s and an interval of 5s.





```
"waiter": {
    "interval": 5,
    "timeout": 180
},
```

Parameter description

--region: Set this parameter to the region where your instance is located.



--waiter: Parameters after waiter must be in JSON format and enclosed in double quotation marks. The table below lists the required and optional parameters:

Parameter	Required	Description
expr	Yes	The field that you want to query. Use JMESPath to query the value of the specified field.
to	Yes	The target value of the field that you want to query.
timeout	No	The timeout period for polling in seconds.
interval	No	The polling interval in seconds.



Using Advanced Features

Operation Scenarios

This document describes how to use the advanced features of TCCLI International Version, including multi-version API access, nearest access point specifying, and return result filtering.

Directions

Multi-version API access

Some products may have multiple versions of APIs, and TCCLI accesses the latest version by default. If you want to access a specific legacy version, you can do so in the following way (with CVM as an example).







# Set the default version of the CVM product: 2017-03-12
tccli configure set cvm.version 2017-03-12

# Specify the version number in real time when using
tccli cvm help --version 2017-03-12
tccli cvm DescribeZones help --version 2017-03-12
tccli cvm DescribeZones --version 2017-03-12
```

Specify the nearest access point (Endpoint)



By default, TCCLI requests the nearest endpoint for accessing a service. You can also specify your own endpoint for a product (with CVM as an example).





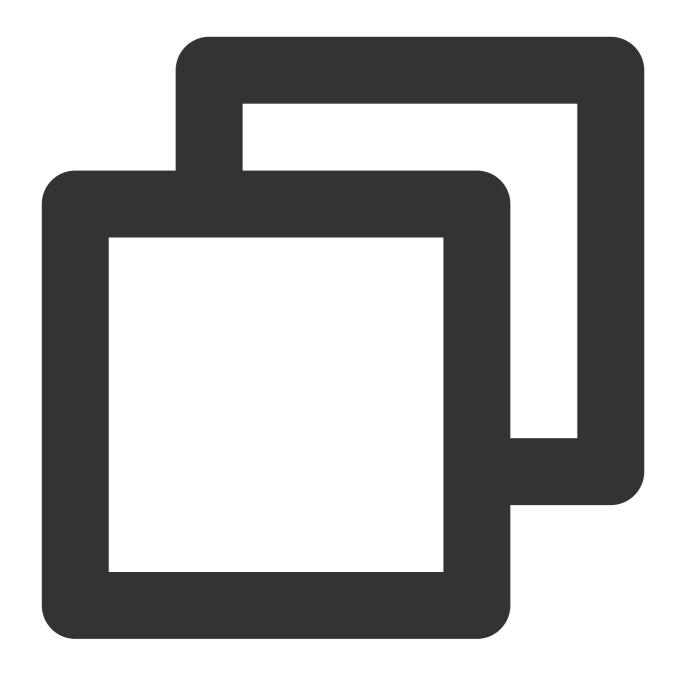
